Priority Target: Develop a safety and security plan and procedures

The school district has used a published flip chart that no longer meets the broad needs of the district. Therefore, the subcommittee recognized the need to research and develop an emergency operation plan including an incident command system so that district personnel may respond appropriately to multiple types of emergencies to ensure the safety and security of all students and personnel.

Priority Target: *Main door security*

Tours of the school facilities brought to light the antiquated security system in place in the schools. This information was also gleaned from a review of the Satisfaction Surveys administered in preparation for this Strategic Plan. Malfunctioning or broken security cameras compromise student and staff safety. The absence of written procedures for answering the door, especially in light of the current architecture of the school offices, identified main door security as a priority target.

Priority Target: Bus Safety

Bus safety was identified as an area of concern on the Satisfaction Survey. In addition, there have been safety issues identified by bus drivers due to motorists ignoring the bus' stop arm when loading and unloading students at the corner bus stops.

Priority Target: Social/emotional well-being

The district has consistently worked with students' social/emotional well-being. In response to Satisfaction Survey comments, parent concerns, and newly passed State legislation, Board policies and District procedures will be implemented to address bullying concerns, including social media and cyberbullying.
